Large Noh theater mask representing Garuda. a very expressive mask in red and black lacquer from the Meiji period dating from the 2nd half of the 19th century.

Garuda is depicted with furrowed eyebrows and a piercing, slightly golden gaze.

the quality of the lacquer is magnificent with a superb moire glaze ranging from black to gold. a superb mask of very good quality with a rather exceptional subject.
