Description

Rare and unique menu of the Foreign Legion dated 1943 from the RMLE regiment (marching regiment of the Foreign Legion) of the CHR (company outside the ranks) dating from the 2nd World War, for the taking of command of Captain Liorzou. Died for France in Tubingen, from wounds. He was then in the 2nd RMLE. The outlines of the drawing are done in pen, the colors are put like a watercolor. The inscription on the bumper "Hand it over to me" is not the name of the jeep but a play on words on the initials of the Marching Regiment of the Foreign Legion commonly called by the elders "Reumeuleu"... The signature of the drawing must be identified. Dimensions: Closed: 24 x 24 cm. Open: 48 x 24 cm. R.L.M.E. or R.M.L.E (marching regiment of the Foreign Legion) becomes 3°R.E.I. 3rd foreign

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infantry regiment the R.M.L.E. comprises a staff and three battalions each composed of a non-ranking company (C.H.R.), a support company (C.A.B.) and three companies of riflemen-voltigeurs.

This is Martial Louis Sébastien LIORZOU: born in Finistère, in Relecq-Kerhouon on May 21, 1911. Son of François Liorzou, gunsmith worker at the port, and Anna Marie Calvez without profession. Admitted to the ESM in 1931, ranked 280th out of 439 and awarded trousseaus. Assigned to the 4th RTT upon leaving the ESM, to take rank on October 1, 1933. Lieutenant in the regiment by decree of September 22, 1935. Passed to the 1st Foreign Regiment by decision of August 20, 1937. On departure for the TOE in 1938. Married in Saïda in Algeria on December 23, 1940 with Gisèle Françoise Rondeau. Died for France in Germany, in Tubingen, on April 23, 1945 from wounds. He was then in the 2nd RMLE. Incendiary grenades set fire to two houses where the shots were coming from. The victims fall. The company found itself in an annoying situation because the enemy managed to cut off the convoy: the recovery service and the supply vehicle were surrounded. The ambulance takes the injured. According to information received from the 3rd Squadron from a captured German, there is an entire SS battalion in the village. The recovery vehicle sends a message: "Ammunition is exhausted, the enemy is surrounding us, we have two seriously injured."
