



## Wine Trolley By Wmf



## Description

This wine trolley bottle holder from the WMF brand is made of silver metal and consists of a central barrel intended to accommodate the bottle. This barrel can tilt on an axis which also connects the two large wheels. These imposing wheels feature spokes in the shape of lambrequins decorated with clovers and fleur-de-lis, characteristic of the art nouveau style. The entire bottle holder is richly decorated, drawing inspiration from the Louis XIV style with art nouveau details. The handle is decorated with a caryatid surmounting a bunch of grapes and the barrel of the bottle holder has openwork patterns in the shape of a rosette, reinforcing its decorative character. You will find the following hallmarks on this bottle holder: Hallmark used by the brand between 1910 and 1914: WMFG
