Noh plays, a traditional form of Japanese theater. His prints are easily recognizable thanks to their distinctive subjects and artistic style. Tsukioka Kogyo was born on April 18, 1869, with the first name Hanyu Sadanosuke in Tokyo. When she was fifteen, her mother married Tsukioka Yoshitoshi, the famous ukiyo-e printmaker. Under the guidance of his father-in-law, Kogyo adopted the surname of Tsukioka and received his initial training in Japanese printmaking. Influenced by his father-in-law's passion for Noh Theater, Kogyo developed an interest in this form traditional Japanese theatrical art. Noh Theater Printer: Each renowned artist is often synonymous with a particular subject. For Tsukioka Kogyo, this subject is Noh Theater. While he created several of the notable nature prints and drawings depicting the Russo-Japanese War.
