A cylindrical yellow-glazed, carved bamboo form Chinese brushpot with a dark yellow monochrome coating. It features a relief decoration of a fine Phoenix bird (Fenghuang) in front of a flowering tree near large flowers. The exterior decoration continues with an image of a classical Chinese beetle, all within a landscape with the sun, clouds, flowers, and a tree.

The Phoenix, also known as Fenghuang in Chinese, has a long and rich history in Chinese culture, dating back to at least the Han dynasty (206 BCE-220 CE). In Chinese mythology, the Phoenix is often depicted as a powerful and divine bird that symbolizes renewal, rebirth, and immortality. It represents the union of yin and yang and is often associated with the Empress and feminine power. It is also considered one of

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the Four Symbols of the Chinese constellations, which represent the cardinal directions.

In Chinese culture, the Phoenix is associated with Feng Shui, the practice of harmonizing one's surroundings to promote good energy and fortune. The Phoenix is said to bring prosperity and good luck and is often incorporated into Chinese architecture, furniture, and clothing as a decorative motif. The beetle in Chinese traditions is often associated with prosperity and good fortune.
