Engraving framed under glass, of the church of St nicaise of Reims in the XVIIIth, started in 1229 by Hucs Libergier and finished in 1297 by Robert de Coucy, demolished in 1800 by its purchaser the citizen Sauterre. Printing house D'aubert & Cie XIXe circa 1840/50. Good general condition. I note slight foxing. Dimensions: Height 61 cm, width 45 cm.

- The cathedral Notre-Dame de Reims: It is known for having been, from the XIth century, the place of almost all the coronations of the kings of France. The troubles of the French Revolution: Some statues are broken, portals torn off, the scepter and the hand of justice burned. The cathedral is transformed into a fodder store and the project of razing it is quickly abandoned (partially destroyed). In 1860, Eugène

Reims Cathedral was called the "martyr cathedral" because, in 1914, shortly after the start of hostilities, it began to be bombed by the Germans. The first shells fell on the city of Reims and on the cathedral on September 4, 1914, just before the German troops entered the city.
