Superb pair of candlesticks with odalisques in gilt bronze from the Napoleon III period, signed Louis Kley on the support spheres at the back. a pair of candlesticks quite unexpected and specific to the work of Kley, in fact this pair of candlesticks play on symmetry and are pendants but if you look closely each of the vestals have different features, hairstyles, clothes and jewelry. we find the style of this famous sculptor of the 19th century who was very fond of pairs and pendants in his work with often children and putti!

the two young oriental women are lovely and form a pendant while being very different. They each rest on a sphere itself on a worked and

Louis Kley: Born on March 17, 1833 in Sens, Louis Kley was an apprentice in jewelry before turning, in 1850, to sculpture and taking lessons from Justin-Marie Lequien. He exhibited between 1853 and 1897 and produced a large number of statues, statuettes, busts, medallions, groups and bas-reliets that are still frequently auctioned. He received the silver medal at the 1889 Universal Exhibition in Paris. He died in Sens in 1911.
