Extremely rare wedding necklace from the state of Orissa (Eastern India).

These necklaces are believed to be made with Venetian beads that arrived in India in the 19th century.

Such necklaces were worn by women of various tribes in Eastern India and sometimes covered the entire body with threads hanging from the neck and shoulders.

The women of the "Bonda" tribe, protected from Orissa wear beads as their main form of clothing.

The necklace has the traditional 8 brass balls and a knot closure, all the bead strands are intact and

The Mulkutti is a brooch hung on the nose, it is set with precious stones and symbolizes marriage and purity.

The mangalsutra is a necklace of black stones and small golden balls or two rows of black stones and a gold pendant.

It serves as a wedding ring: the husband puts it around his wife's neck.

These black beads are supposed to protect the husband and the marriage of the married woman.

In the South, this jewel is called Tali. It is a small cotton rope or a thin gold chain on which hangs a pendant formed of three triangles, but this varies according to the castes.

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
