In reality our drawing represents Frederick 1st of Prussia. Indeed, the cover of the saddle bears a monogram with FR (for "Friedericus Rex"). In addition, Friedrich wears this mustache quite specific. The current portrait may be dated after 1706, when all over Europe the images of the new king were scattered. I (German: Friedrich I.; 11 July 1657 - 25
February 1713), of the Hohenzollern dynasty,
was (as Frederick III) Elector of Brandenburg
(1688-1713) and Duke of Prussia in personal
union (Brandenburg-Prussia). The latter function
he upgraded to royalty, becoming the first King in
Prussia (1701-1713). From 1707 he was in
personal union the sovereign prince of the
Principality of Neuchâtel (German: Fürstentum
Neuenburg). He was also the paternal grandfather
of Frederick the Great.
