The Luba (or Baluba in Tchiluba) are a people of Central Africa originally from Katanga, more precisely from the region of the Luba River, from which their name derives (Baluba meaning "the Lubas"). Their history dates back to a secession of the Songhoi ethnic group, under the leadership of Ilunga Kalala, who had the old king Kongolo, venerated in the form of a python, killed. In the 16th century, they founded a state, organized into decentralized chiefdoms, which extended from the Kasai River to Lake Tanganyika. These chiefdoms, without real borders, generally included three villages at most. The Luba had two types of sculptures: the mikisi mihasi, representing ancestors or spirits, and the mikisi
