Baluster-shaped liturgical tin cruet. Hallmark used by François II BROUILLET, who became a master in 1778 in Saint-Germain-en-Laye and settled in Paris in 1795. Height: 12 cm. PARIS, early 19th century. This master died in 1805 but his hallmarks were used by his widow and then by his sister until 1819.
