Clad in shining armor, the central figure kneels before an elder--perhaps a father, abbot, or noble--surrounded by women, children, a loyal dog, and other onlookers. The setting is a richly atmospheric interior with checkered flooring, evoking a gothic great hall suffused with emotional tension and noble

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dignity. The meticulous detailing of armor, textiles, gestures, and character expressions reflects the historical accuracy and dramatic realism typical of the Romantic-historicist style led by Paul Delaroche, Flatters' mentor. Every figure is captured with studied posture and poise, as if in mid-performance of a historical tableau vivant, carefully researched and executed with academic finesse. About the Artist Trained at the Royal Academy of Arts in Düsseldorf under Karl Ferdinand Sohn, Richard Edmond Flatters (b. Saint-Cloud) moved to Paris in 1843 to study in Paul Delaroche's atelier. He exhibited at the Paris Salon from 1845, showing a refined talent for genre and historical subjects. This painting is very likely the one listed in the 1848 Salon (no. 1692). After the revolutionary upheavals of 1848, Flatters returned to Oldenburg, possibly out of political concern, though he continued painting scenes of both courtly history and contemporary social tension, including a rarely seen barricade scene inspired by the revolution. The Frame & Condition This painting is housed in a sumptuous Second Empire giltwood frame, datable to 1867-1868, with excellent sculpted detail and original water-gilding. Unlike heavily ornamented models, this one is elegantly restrained, enhancing the painting without overpowering it--a rare example of balance and refinement.Original canvas on robust wooden stretcher with cross bracesNo relining, no major restorations notedOriginal signature and date clearly legibleExcellent overall condition, with stable paint layer and well-preserved contrastsFrame in excellent structural and aesthetic condition, with minor wear consistent with age Historical & Artistic Context Flatters' work belongs to the Romantic "Troubadour" painting tradition, a style that flourished in 19th-century France with a nostalgic fascination for the Middle Ages. From the 1830s onward, artists like Delaroche popularized narrative history painting, focusing on episodes of honor,

sacrifice, and chivalry."Departure for the Crusades" perfectly embodies this spirit: a fusion of medieval romanticism, academic precision, and emotional depth, deeply rooted in the public's taste for evocative historical drama. It reflects the 19th-century desire to reconnect with lost ideals through carefully imagined reconstructions of the past.
