STATUETTE called IbejiYoruba culture, NigeriaFirst half of the 20th centuryWood and pigmentsH.: 26.5; W.: 6.5 cm(traces of wood-eating insects) Monoxyle anthropomorphic statuette standing on a circular base, with openwork arms and hands resting on her upper thighs. Its tapered face is scarred at the temples, cheeks and forehead. His conical openwork headdress is entirely incised and enhanced with blue pigments. Ibeji statuettes work in pairs: Taiwo and Kehinde are twins. These sculptures represent them. They are considered important figures in everyday life.
