




Army Hat Of The Samurai 'jingasa' Of The Hosokawa Clan, Edo Period - Japanese - 18th Century

A Fine Japanese Edo Period Jingasa Depicting the Hosokawa Family Crest Japan, circa 1750
This rare and well-preserved jingasa (military camp hat) is made of wood or black lacquered leather, decorated with two interlocking gilt circles, representing the mon (emblem) of the powerful Hosokawa family--one of the most influential daimyo families and landowners in Japan during the Edo period. The minimalist elegance of this headgear reflects both its practical function--protection from the sun and rain--and its symbolic dimension, asserting clan identity and loyalty on the battlefield and in ceremonial processions. Condition: Light wear consistent with age. Diameter: 40 cm.
