



## Tang Dynasty Standing Court Lady In Painted Terracotta -- Certificate Of Authenticity (qed)

### Description

Elegant funerary figure of a Tang Dynasty court lady (???), modelled in reddish-grey terracotta, coated with a white slip and painted in original polychromy. Authentic pigment remains are clearly visible: pink on the cheeks and lips, black outlining the eyes, green residues on the sleeves, and a dark band marking the waist. The high coiffure, with frontal volume and a lateral volute above the right side, is characteristic of the second half of the 8th century. The crossed hands are hidden beneath long, pleated sleeves. The surface shows a homogeneous burial patina with natural oxidation abrasions and minor ancient flaking, enhancing its authenticity. No lead glaze, confirming a true paint-on-slip technique. Formal and material analysis Posture: Standing lady with hands hidden inside long, puffed sleeves; long robe falling in softly incised folds, waist accentuated by a dark painted band. Head & Coiffure: Full oval face, pink cheeks, eyes lined in black; high hairstyle with a lateral scroll typical of the 8th century. Surface: Ancient white slip with fine crackling and micro-lifting; well-integrated green and red pigment remains within the patina. Base: Integral rectangular base with irregular contours and visible workshop tool marks -- clear sign of original manufacture.
