Detailed observation under $\times 10$ magnification and raking light of a posthumous silver denarius of Septimius Severus deified, struck in Rome around 211 AD, displaying a refined bearded portrait and a CONSECRATIO reverse featuring an eagle on thunderbolt, emblem of the emperor's apotheosis. Obverse: legend DIVO SEVERO PIO fully legible; bare head right, precisely engraved hair and beard; balanced centering and complete border of dots. Reverse: Jovian eagle standing on thunderbolt, wings spread, head left; the rendering of feathers and stance conveys solemnity and symmetry. Surface state: clear silver with satin reflections, radial flan stress lines typical of ancient striking, no casting traces, and a stable, homogeneous ancient patina.
