Decoration of two snakes tied to a cartouche in the shape of a shield with flowers of olive branches With phylactery Ref.: 25/G/68  
Phylactery: " ELEC. DIASCORDI"  
Pharmacopoeia: ELEC. DIASCORDIPasty medicinal preparation based on scordium  
Scordium electuary was a compound preparation preserved with honey, taken from the Galenic and medieval tradition. Scordium - or water germander - was renowned for its properties: - Antipyretic (against fever) - Antidote (against venoms and poisons) - Cardi tonic and stomachic - Resolutive (promotes sweating and digestion)
