Stamped interior mark, initials SM, according to the SAINT MAUR standard: 1° - minimum fill at the base of the bowl: 1.39 liters 2° - fill level: 1.53 liters. Gauge mark with the arms of the Condé family, owners of the office. Height: 28 cm. PARIS, Mid-18th century. In perfect condition and of fine quality, from the "Pinte" of Saint-Maur, bearing a rare gauge mark with the arms of the Princes of Condé. Between 1589 and 1823, these arms were those of the Dukes of Bourbon, which became vacant when Henry IV became King of France. The Princes of

Condé then adopted them, simplifying the band into a baton. These arms are "azure, three fleurs-de-lis or, and a baton sinister gules." A bit of history: It's worth noting that these pitchers were the official wine measures of the Ancien Régime. The capacity of those used in inns, drinking establishments, etc., was supposed to be periodically checked by the royal or ecclesiastical authorities to ensure the consumer received "correct measure," but in reality, this regulation was rarely enforced, and pitchers bearing gauging marks are quite rare. The metric system appeared at the very beginning of the 19th century and took several decades to become established due to the resistance to change shown by users, but little by little these uniform cylindrical measures ended up replacing the jugs which, it is true, presented a variety of interesting shapes characteristic of their place of manufacture, but also an infinite number of different gaugings from one city to another and often even from one village to another, however close they may be. This significantly complicated trade.
