A rare Art Nouveau period example of a bronze medal set, chased and signed by Giovanni Cariati, known as "Gicar" (1865-1917). Born in Naples in 1865, he taught himself medal design from 1903 and organized exhibitions in Paris in 1906 and Milan in 1909 before emigrating to America, settling in New York in 1912, where he died on June 22, 1917. CARIATI, Giovanni (1865-1917) Italian-American sculptor. Born in Naples in 1865. Taught himself medal design from 1903; He organized exhibitions in Paris in 1906 and Milan in 1909 before coming to America and New York in 1912. He persuaded the American Numismatic Society to organize an exhibition of his work, which opened on December 11, 1912. A catalog was published by the Society (see 101 below). He died in New York on June 22, 1917.
