Analysis & expertise

This dupondius of Germanicus, struck at Rome under the reign of Caligula (AD 37-41), corresponds to the type recorded as RIC 57 (Gaius); BMCRE 93-100 (Caligula); BN 140-51 (Caligula). Its paired scenes--triumph in a quadriga on the obverse and the recovery of the standards on the reverse with S C in the field--fit squarely within the Julio-Claudian commemorative tradition celebrating the memory and victories of the prince.

Close examination with a $\times 10$ loupe and raking light: a methodical review of the photographs--edge, fields, relief, and

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legends--shows a broad bronze flan of a size consistent with a dupondius, with a nuanced brown-green patina and areas of stabilized copper oxidation visible on the surface, notably in the recesses of the relief and around the lettering, a phenomenon consistent with long-term preservation and extended circulation.

On the obverse, the triumphal scene remains readable: GERMANICVS CAESAR, Germanicus, bareheaded and draped, standing right in a chariot, holding an eagle-tipped sceptre and the reins in the left hand, driving a quadriga to the right. The chariot, decorated with a figure of Victory advancing right, remains identifiable despite wear on the highest relief, while the surrounding legend is overall intelligible, with localized weakening of certain letters at the edge.

On the reverse, the type SIGNIS RECEP^T DEVICTIS GERM is discernible: Germanicus, bareheaded, wearing cuirass and short tunic, standing left, right leg bent at the knee and drawn back behind the left, with cloak over the left arm in which he cradles an aquila, and extending the right hand in a gesture of authority. The letters S - C appear across the fields, in keeping with senatorial issues of the large bronzes, and the composition remains structured despite wear and patina variation.

Historical context

This issue belongs to Caligula's politics of memory. By honoring Germanicus--a popular military figure and a prominent member of the Julio-Claudian dynasty--the imperial regime anchors its legitimacy in the continuity of successes against the Germans. The recovery of lost standards and the celebration of the triumph become, here, an iconographic language serving dynastic memory and political cohesion.

Cultural value

For collectors, this dupondius offers the distinctive appeal of a large imperial bronze with a strong symbolic charge, combining triumph, recovery of the standards, and a gesture of authority. The whole illustrates how Roman coinage becomes a medium for historical narrative and dynastic propaganda, presenting a piece in which metal, patina, and iconography directly engage with the history of Roman power.

Traceability & guarantees

Each specimen is examined, described, and accompanied by a certificate of authenticity consistent with the standards of the art and heritage market. The study is conducted with close observation under a $\times 10$ loupe and raking light. Provenance is European, sourced from an established numismatic dealer, and the acquisition stems from a specialized international transaction carried out within a recognized numismatic network and validated by reference experts, according to the highest standards of the art and heritage market.
