Description

Litron shaped cup and saucer, orange ground with grey painted landscape with hare. Marked by Halley, Parisian decorator active during the Empire period. Size: Cup height 6.2 cm, saucer diameter 12.5 cm Charles Halley in Paris during the Empire period, 1801-1810. Lit: Charles Halley began his career as a potter on Rue Montmartre in Paris around 1780. He is mentioned in almanacs from 1793 onwards. In 1803, he is cited in a notarial deed as a potter and porcelain merchant. His factory decorated white porcelain from the factories of Locré, Nast, and Deuster. In 1811, Charles Halley married his daughter to the son of Lebon, a dealer in crystal, earthenware, and porcelain, combining the two businesses to create the Halley Lebon brand, which came into use from that period onwards.
