



Severus Alexander Denarius "virtvs Avg - Romulus" -- Certificate Of Authenticity

Description

Analysis & expertise

A silver denarius of Severus Alexander, struck at Rome in AD 228, whose collecting interest lies in a particularly expressive Virtus iconography, showing the emperor in the guise of Romulus walking right, carrying a spear and a trophy--an emblematic combination precisely catalogued as RIC 224 / BMC 522 / Cohen 584, a typological concordance verified by the simultaneous agreement of legends and depicted attributes. Careful observation under $\times 10$ magnification and raking light: examination of the specimen highlights a regular-module silver flan, a well-ordered portrait relief (forehead, eye, nose, and chin line clearly structured), as well as a reverse scene that remains legible through its essential markers--forward stride, spear held in

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the right hand, trophy slung over the left shoulder--together with an even grey toning and fine circulation marks compatible with the normal history of a preserved imperial denarius, without detracting from overall readability or cabinet appeal.

Surface condition (descriptive observations): fields showing an old micro-texture and light friction, with satisfactory preservation of the decisive reliefs (laurel wreath, profile, titulature, spear, and trophy), ensuring stable readability and a well-balanced numismatic presence.

Historical context

The VIRTUS AVG reverse, by presenting the emperor "in the manner of Romulus," belongs to a rhetoric of legitimation in which virtue is not merely a moral value, but a quality of command and foundation, intended to place the young prince under the sign of Roman origins and protective authority--a theme well attested for this Rome denarius type dated to 228.

Cultural value

In a classic format highly sought after by collectors of the Severan period, this denarius offers an immediately "narrative" scene--spear, trophy, forward stride--that powerfully documents the use of heroic iconography in Roman coinage, and serves as an excellent milestone for a collection devoted to

personifications (Virtus), dynastic propaganda, or the foundational references of Rome mobilized by imperial power.

Traceability & guarantees

The provenance is European, from an established numismatic dealer, and the acquisition was made through a specialized international transaction, conducted within a recognized numismatic network and validated to the highest standards of the art and heritage market; the attribution is supported by concordance with the published references RIC 224 / BMC 522 / Cohen 584, consistently cited in documentation and sale archives.
