



Trajan Quinarius "triumphal Victory" -- Certificate Of Authenticity

Analysis & expertise

A Trajan silver quinarius, struck at Rome early in the reign, whose type--laureate portrait on the obverse and Victory advancing on the reverse--corresponds, by typological concordance, to the quinarius listed as RIC 44 / RSC 226, with the legend sequence IMP CAES NERVA TRAIAN AVG GERM on the obverse and P M TR P COS III P P on the reverse, a description fixed in a stable manner across consultable numismatic references and databases. Careful observation under $\times 10$ magnification and raking light: the specimen, of small module and light weight, shows a strike consistent with Rome's quinarius production on a naturally irregular flan, with the principal relief preserved--the laureate profile and, on the

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reverse, the dynamic silhouette of Victory with wreath and palm--while the ancient circulation, visible in the softness of the fields and partial attenuation at the periphery, does not prevent identification through the decisive iconographic markers of the type.

Authority: Trajan (AD 98-117).

Mint: Rome.

Denomination / metal: Quinarius, silver (AR).

Diameter / weight: 14 mm; 1.43 g (data recorded for the specimen).

Obverse (type and legend): IMP CAES NERVA TRAIAN AVG GERM, laureate head right (segments of titulature readable and recognizable according to the type formula).

Reverse (type and legend): P M TR P COS III P P, Victory advancing right, holding wreath and palm (structuring attributes observable on the specimen despite even wear).

Historical context

The quinarius, a silver denomination smaller than the denarius, served as a privileged vehicle for conveying, in a compact format, an immediately legible imperial message; the Trajan/Victory pairing belongs to an official language in which the wreath and palm condense the idea of legitimate success and continuity of honors, at a moment when the titulature GERM still participates in affirming the military achievements of the nascent principate.

Cultural value

For the collector, this quinarius offers a highly sought quality: the density of a small module that preserves, within a few millimeters, an immediately attributable imperial portrait and a reverse of strong symbolic clarity--Victory being one of the most universal visual archetypes of Roman coinage--making it an excellent milestone for a Trajan collection, for early issues, or for silver "Victory" types.

Traceability & guarantees

The provenance is European, from an established

numismatic dealer, and the acquisition was made through a specialized international transaction conducted within a recognized numismatic network, in accordance with the highest standards of the art and heritage market; the attribution is established by concordance of the legends and type with RIC 44 / RSC 226, as described in consultable references, and by comparison with like specimens published in standard numismatic databases.

Each specimen is examined, described, and accompanied by a certificate of authenticity consistent with the standards of the art and heritage market, the description remaining deliberately tied to elements verifiable by observation and documentation.
