Chinese Painting - Kakemono: There are two types of Chinese paintings: vertical scroll paintings and horizontal scroll paintings. This is a vertical scroll painting, also known as a Kakemono. Very large painting, a mix of painting, screen printing, and Chinese stamps. The Structure: - In China and Japan, a kakemono is a painting on silk or paper, framed as a scroll. This painting is intended to be hung on the wall. The first kakemono appeared during the Tang Dynasty in China. - This kakemono is presented in the form of a scroll supported by a wooden rod at the top. Chinese Culture: The Chinese practice painting with a brush on rice paper. There are also some Chinese paintings on silk, but silk is a very fragile material. To create a beautiful painting, a Chinese artist needs four elements: a brush, paper, an inkstone, and ink sticks. To transform the ink stick into liquid ink, the stick must be rubbed on an inkstone and water added (a difficult step, as finding the right balance between water and powdered ink is essential).
