Darling is recognized as the dean of Toledo's painters. He had a notable career in Europe before returning to Ohio, where he practiced as a painter and teacher. Born in Sandusky, Ohio, shortly before the Civil War, he began studying art at the age of fourteen under the tutelage of Henry Mosler in Cincinnati in 1870. At nineteen, he left for Europe with Mosler to further his studies. He studied in Munich with Frank Duveneck and at the Royal Academy, before continuing his apprenticeship at the Académie Julian in Paris under Jean-Paul Laurens and Benjamin Constant. He also benefited from the teaching of William Merritt
