Specimen: Original Finish and Patina:

Authenticity is underpinned by the retention of the original polychrome cold-painted patina, a signature finishing technique used on high-quality editions of the period. Enamel Accents: A key feature distinguishing this piece is the presence of colored enamel accents used to enhance the dancer's jewelry and costume elements. Foundry Quality: The chiseling of the bronze is of superb quality, reflecting high standards of execution.
