The white enamelled dial is adorned with black Roman numerals and signed "L'Épée - Fondée en 1839 - Sainte-Suzanne France", a testament to the manufacture's prestigious French watchmaking expertise. This elegant clock features a sober, refined architecture, entirely glazed on all four sides, revealing the high-quality mechanical movement. The gilded brass case, with its balanced lines and meticulous finishing, rests on

a molded stepped base and is topped by a carrying handle characteristic of officer's clocks. Breguet-style hands add a further touch of elegance. The clock is equipped with a hand-wound mechanical movement with alarm and striking functions. The glass back allows the mechanism to be admired, as well as the circular striking gong.
