Description

A striking Japanese porcelain figure of Jigoku Dayu, the legendary Hell Courtesan, produced in Arita around 1920. The subject is identified by the presence of a traditional kiseru tobacco pipe, an attribute closely associated with high-ranking courtesans in Japanese culture.

The figure reflects the famous legend of Jigoku Dayu and her spiritual transformation following her encounter with the Zen master Ikkyu Sojun. As a result, she became associated with Kannon and entered Japanese art as a symbol of enlightenment emerging from worldly experience.

Decorated in the classic Imari palette of cobalt blue, iron-red and gold, the figure combines fine modelling with richly detailed ornament. The reverse features karakusa scrolls, chrysanthemum

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blossoms and a geometric medallion arranged as a complete 360-degree composition. Collectors particularly value figures of Jigoku Dayu because they are encountered far less frequently than conventional representations of Kannon.
