It also makes a stunning statement in a spacious foyer or entryway, where it can showcase a large vase, a sculpture, or a floral arrangement. The original white marble tabletop rests on an impressive hand-forged tripod base, richly adorned with graceful griffins, twisted columns, and an elegant spiral culminating in a refined finial. the marble tabletop has developed a beautiful natural patina, making each table truly one-of-a-kind. The tabletop simply rests on the base. If desired, it can be permanently secured using a suitable adhesive or double-sided foam tape; however, we have chosen to leave it removable to ensure safe transport. The wrought-iron base has been carefully stripped of thick rust and treated with a protective black wax, thus preserving its authentic appearance. The table shows normal signs of wear given its age and history, including a small crack in the marble. This in no way affects its stability; the table is sturdy, in good condition, and ready for immediate use. A rare decorative piece, rich in history and with a unique style, ideal for lovers of authentic antique furniture and interiors full of character.
