Description

Large 19th-century globe mounted on its original turned and blackened wooden base with a brass half-meridian frame. Our educational globe was compiled by Charles Périgot, a history and geography teacher at Lycée St. Louis, drawn by A.L.P. Mouraux--Institut Géographique de Paris--published in Paris by Ch. Delagrave, located at 15 rue Soufflot, specializing in school supplies. Charles Périgot, born on January 22, 1828, in Rouen and died on June 17, 1885, in Paris, was a French geographer and historian. Admitted in 1850 to the École Normale Supérieure and in 1857 to the Agrégation des Lettres, Périgot initially taught history and geography in Alençon and Douai. In 1864, he was appointed to the Lycée Saint-Louis, and later to the École des hautes études commerciales. He is

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the author of classic geography textbooks and atlases that were of great service to the academic world of his time. He is best known for his *Atlas général de géographie physique et politique ancienne, du Moyen Âge et moderne* (General Atlas of Physical and Political Geography: Ancient, Medieval, and Modern), Paris, F. Tandou, 1865. The famous publishing house Charles Delagrave was founded by him in 1865; it remains the leading publisher of the late 19th century, specializing in educational globes and textbooks (for schools and universities). Alp. Mouraux was a 19th-century French illustrator and cartographer, known for his work on terrestrial and celestial globes as well as geographic maps. These educational globes incorporate the geographical knowledge of the time, sometimes including the route of the Suez Canal, which opened in 1869. Since this route is not visible on our globe, we can therefore date its creation to before 1869. Total height: 59 cm Globe diameter: 33 cm
