The baguettes provide a rhythmic pattern around the central stone, while the cushion-cut diamonds form the bulk of the decoration. The lower section widens into a geometric fan-shaped design, while the upper

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section features a tiered motif that crowns the topaz. The alternation of different diamond cuts, the clean lines, the geometric recesses, and the openwork setting give this brooch a quintessentially Art Deco design that is at once balanced, powerful, and highly refined. The openwork reverse reveals the structure of the setting as well as the pin mechanism.
