Description

A pair of patinated bronze Buddhist bodhisattvas. These cast bronze figures depict specific Buddhist deities or bodhisattvas seated atop their sacred mounts. The sculptures follow the iconographic tradition of Lopburi/Khmer. The feline creature is adorned with stylized saddle blankets featuring floral and decorative motifs, common in Thai-Burmese altar bronzes. In this tradition, figures riding tigers or lions generally represent a protective aspect of a bodhisattva or an earth deity associated with courage and spiritual dominion. The long, tapered muzzle and low stance often allow this mount to be identified as a stylized wild animal. In Buddhist iconography, the deity Marichi (goddess of the dawn) is classically depicted riding a wild boar or a chariot drawn by wild boars. Tiger: 14 cm wide,
