Description

19th century Raphael and La Fornarina in the Studio Oil on canvas, 19.5 x 22 cm - with frame, 26 x 29 cm The painting evokes the intimate atmosphere of a painter's studio: Raphael, seated on a stool with his legs stretched out and his gaze turned upward in an almost ecstatic gesture, holds brushes and a palette in his hand, captured in the moment of artistic creation. Standing beside him, La Fornarina watches him with an affectionate and engaged expression, draped in a gown of warm red and ochre tones that contrasts with the artist's dark attire. In the foreground, a large easel with the canvas in progress is visible, and at the window, a soft light gently illuminates the scene, in keeping with the nineteenth-century painterly taste for studio interiors rich in narrative suggestion. The composition, simple yet

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well-constructed, emphasizes the relationship between the two figures rather than the technical depiction of the act of painting, suggesting a moment of intimacy and shared inspiration. The subject depicted here, though ideally set in the sixteenth century, actually belongs to an iconography that enjoyed immense popularity in the nineteenth century, when Romantic culture rediscovered and reinvented the figure of Raphael not only as the supreme master of Renaissance painting but also as the protagonist of a romantic tale brimming with charm. Numerous artists of the time took on this theme, each with their own variations: among them Felice Schiavoni, Ingres, Giuseppe Sogni, and Francesco Gandolfi, who were able to combine their admiration for the genius from Urbino with a more or less idealized and sentimental interpretation of his relationship with his beloved. At the heart of this iconographic popularity lies the alleged love story between Raphael and La Fornarina, traditionally identified as Margherita Luti, the daughter of a Roman baker. This story is largely shrouded in legend, fueled above all by nineteenth-century Romantic sensibilities, which were always eager to discern traits of passion and humanity in the great artists of the past. The only element that has sustained this tradition over the centuries is a pictorial detail: in the famous portrait of La Fornarina, now housed at the Borghese Gallery, the woman wears a bracelet engraved with the painter's name. From this small but significant detail, an entire romantic mythology has developed, one capable of inspiring the artistic production of an entire century, eager to transform the lives of the old masters into tales of ideal and romantic beauty.
