Alain Bonnefoit was a student at the Duperré School of Applied Arts from 1953 to 1955, then at the National School of Fine Arts in Paris from 1956 to 1957, as well as at the Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Brussels in 1959 to 1960, then pupil of the sculptor Antoniucci Volti at the Beaux-Arts in Paris.

Painter, her palette rich in colors, is at the service of women in sumptuous bodies . Sculptor in direct carving, he creates in very formed compositions, beautiful volumes which occupy the space.
